## The Role of Russia in Eurasia and the Indo-Pacific

Russia and China are discursively constructing a Eurasian regional order, one that is meant to challenge the Western-led world order. Both countries work out their separate projects for regional order and negotiate how they will align. Russian President Putin created the EAEU and CSTO to form a Greater Eurasian Partnership (GEP) which he planned to link to Asian projects such as ASEAN and to balance China's BRI. The GEP was expected to give Russia a sphere of influence in Eurasia which could be used as a platform to project a great power role in the Indo-Pacific. Putin overestimated ASEAN's interest in Russia's great power role in Asia and he underestimated Central Asia's capacity, especially Kazakhstan's, to resist being within a Russian sphere of influence.

Gaye Christoffersen was formerly a Professor of International Politics, Johns Hopkins University, SAIS, Nanjing Center (2012–2021), teaching courses on Asian energy security, Sino-Japanese relations, and Chinese border provinces' relations with neighboring countries. She has also taught at the Naval Postgraduate School, the University of Hawaii, and Eastern Mediterranean University. She was a Fulbright Professor at Far Eastern Federal University (1992–93) and the Chinese Foreign Affairs University (1998–2000). Recent publications include:

Russia in the Indo-Pacific: New Approaches to Russian Foreign Policy, Routledge (2022) as editor, and author of Sino-Russian Accommodation and Adaptation in Eurasian Regional Order Formation, in that volume.
