



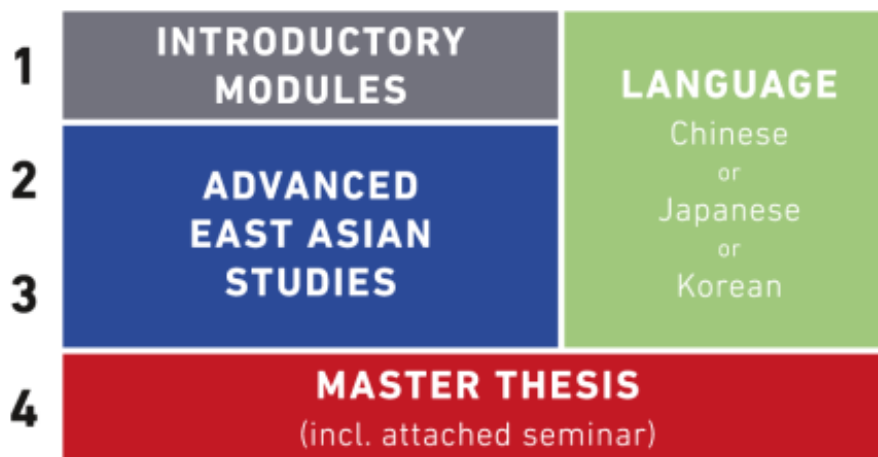

Studienverlauf

Semester



Semester 1: Three compulsory introductory modules help students to familiarize themselves with East Asian studies from different disciplinary perspectives. In addition, students start their training in the language of their choice (Chinese, Japanese or Korean native speakers are not allowed to choose their mother tongue).

Semester 2: There are 18 different modules on Advanced East Asian Studies (AEAS), with ten offered in the winter and eight in the summer term. These modules present problem-oriented and discipline-based perspectives on politics and the society or economy of China, Japan and Korea or the entire East Asian region. Students are expected to select two AEAS and one elective module after which they submit their choice to their advisor for approval.

Semester 3: Students complete their language training and select two additional AEAS and one elective module.

Semester 4: Students concentrate on writing their Master's thesis. The thesis is an independent piece of research about a cutting-edge topic on contemporary East Asia. It is intended to provide evidence of the student's newly acquired knowledge, theoretical and methodological skills in East Asian regional studies, and language proficiency.

Lernergebnisse / Kompetenzen

Students gain a keen understanding of East Asia from its historical development as a region while learning about the major developments in the key countries covered: China, Japan and Korea. The focus of the module is to understand East Asia as a whole, characterized by transnational relations between the key countries (and other countries or actors, where appropriate).

Social science, economic, and business studies approaches incl. the corresponding research methods will be utilized when discussing the different aspects of the social and economic development of East Asia and the transnational and regional integration and interaction.

The course provides a cross-regional context for understanding the East Asian region using a historical lens to shed light on major societal and economic developments that have shaped China, Japan and Korea. Students will be enabled to discuss related issues systematically, utilizing their knowledge from the classes and the readings. The aim is to understand the historical trajectories that shaped the region and its constituent parts, China (Chinese Mainland, Taiwan, Hong Kong, Macau), Democratic People's Republic of Korea, Republic of Korea, Japan and Mongolia.

Lernergebnisse / Kompetenzen

Each lesson is divided into two parts namely Katsudoo (communicative language activities) and Rikai (communicative language competences).

The Intensive Japanese II is a course that, in the same way as the Japanese I, aims at helping learners become able to take part in communicative language activities. There are 53 and 49 Can-do objectives respectively, centered on interactive communication in Japanese.

The Can-do conversations are a little longer than those in the course Japanese I, and include more complex ones. There are also Can-dos that involve extended speaking in front of others, such as presentations and speeches at events.

davon Schlüsselkompetenzen

- Can understand phrases and the highest frequency vocabulary related to areas of most immediate personal relevance (e.g. very basic personal and family information, shopping, local geography, employment).
- Can communicate in simple and routine tasks requiring a simple and direct exchange of information on familiar and routine matters to do with work and free time. Can handle very short social exchanges but is rarely able to understand enough to keep conversation going of his/her own accord.
- Can answer straightforward follow up questions if he/she can ask for repetition and if some help with the formulation of his/her reply is possible.
- Can understand what is said clearly, slowly and directly to him/her in simple everyday conversation; can be made to understand, if the speaker can take the trouble.

Upon completion of this module, students will have acquired an advanced understanding of core methodologies, research techniques, and important theoretical frameworks. They are expected to have an in-depth knowledge of the historical and philosophical underpinnings of Chinese foreign strategy and the interplay between domestic and global system settings on China's positioning in world affairs. They will be able to engage in a theory-based analysis of recent developments in Chinese foreign politics at the regional and global level, China's (changing) role in international organizations, as well as China's positioning in global governance issues (e.g. global climate change, global green growth and sustainable development, global security, global finance).

Within the allotted writing time of 26 weeks, students write and submit an independent piece of research about a cutting-edge topic on contemporary East Asia.
