The dishonest tricks of his rival force Esen to take revenge. Being expelled from his native village, he takes Begimai with him, but is overtaken and beaten almost to death. Esen is destined to find himself and his fate in order to reunite his people. The film will be followed by a discussion with Taalaybek Dayirbekov, main sponsor of the film, and a UNESCO Representative.
