Report on the AURORA-meeting of UDE and VUA in Duisburg



Mid-September, twenty Dutch and German people are lining up for a photo in the shadow of the Gerhard-Mercator-Haus at the Duisburg campus. What these people have in common: a shared mission of matching academic excellence with societal relevance — a mission that sounds quite abstract to be honest. What brought these people together: all of them are either staff members of the Universität Duisburg-Essen (UDE) or the Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam (VUA), both of which are part of the AURORA network which aims to support its members in exactly the mission described above.
