

SCIENTIST IN RESIDENCE

The Scientist-in-Residence is awarded by the University Duisburg-Essen for distinguished scholars in research areas of strategic importance for the university research programs. The award, created in 1998, is made annually with the generous sponsorship of the Sparkasse Essen.

The award enables the university to invite internationally renowned scholars to take up residence at the university in order to interact with researchers and doctoral students. The public lecture by the Scientist-in-Residence covers research frontiers in the awardee's field of expertise, in a format accessible to the general public.



John Creighton Campbell, University Duisburg-Essen "Scientist in Residence" in 2011, received his doctorate from Columbia University and has held executive positions at the Social Science Research Council, the Association for Asian Studies and the Kyoto Center for Japanese Studies. He was Professor of Political Science from 1973–2007 at the University of Michigan, Ann-Arbor, where he supervised over 20 dissertations in contemporary Japanese and East Asian politics. He is currently Visiting Professor at the University of Tokyo, where he coordinates the Social Science Ph. D. Workshop and serves as a Visiting Scholar at the Institute of Gerontology.

He has published twelve books, including volumes with Cambridge University Press, Princeton University Press and Oxford University Press, and extensively in English- and Japanese-language journals and edited volumes in the fields of health policy, social policy, political systems, policy studies and East Asian Studies.

John Creighton Campbell is an expert on the public policy implications of demographic change. He has written extensively on government responses to population aging in Japan, and his recent major work involves comparisons of long-term care insurance policies in Japan, Germany, and other advanced industrial nations, whereby he is especially critical of the German "cash-for-care" system. His research on Japan has shown how the Japanese government is able to maintain a low-cost egalitarian system of health care, with particular advantages for coverage of an aging population.

John Campbell has invited Professor Gerald Curtis, Burgess Professor of Political Science at the Columbia University in New York, to join him in a tandem lecture about the implications of the triple disaster for politics and social policy in Japan. Gerald Curtis is the foremost international expert on the Japanese political system, and has met and advised a number of the post-war Japanese Prime Ministers. His most recent visits to the disaster-struck Northeast regions of Japan are the subject of a new documentary on the social dislocations and political challenges of the triple disaster, televised nationally in Japan by Asahi TV. Gerald Curtis is a member of the Trilateral Commission and in addition to his many awards for his publications and public service, he received the Order of the Rising Sun, Gold and Silver Star bestowed by the Emperor of Japan, one of the highest honors granted by the Japanese government.

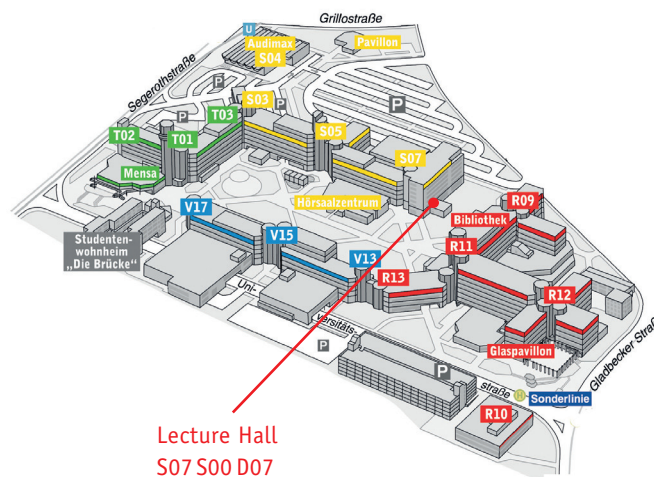
